Freedom word is not easy for the children who are living as a child labour. Specially for girls for them parents were not ready to send children to schools and freed from child labour. You know gender discrimination is so high among not only in poorest community while rich people are also doing discrimination among their children. And without freedom how can they take education and grow themselves. health of the child labourers day by day is decreasing. But after all these things we succeeded to remove 1280 children from bangle and glass, brick, carpet and other places where children are working as child labour and great thing is this all are joined to education some are mainstream in formal education and some are joined to NFEs.

We are happier to our adolescence girls from Gihar community who comes in very lower level of scheduled caste. They have not gone to schools. 146 adolescence girls never joined with education but now they are joined to Non formal education and this is big achievement for us because all the parents of these girls also never gone to schools and now all are cobblers in shikohabad and first time the girls are using the sanitary pads in this duration of the freedom of the country.

Again, we thank you very much our all-stake holders and team members of the Vikas Sansthan. And special thanks to our all donors who have given big support to us for this noble cause.

Section 1. Education Initiatives

1.1. Non-Formal Education

Vikas Sansthan believes that every child has the potential to shine, if given the right opportunity. To ensure this, the organization has been running Non-Formal Education (NFE) Centres for freed child labourers from the labourers. These centres serve as a preparatory, supplementary, and effective alternative to formal schooling, designed especially for children who are out of school, never enrolled, or dropouts. Non-formal education takes place outside the traditional school system and is often described as community education, lifelong education, or second-chance education. Recognizing the



large number of out-of-school children and underserved communities in its operational areas, Vikas Sansthan has made concerted efforts to bridge this gap through its NFE initiatives. The NFE Centres focus not only on academic learning but also on the emotional, physical, social, and psychological growth of children. Tailored programs, creative learning modules, and knowledge-building sessions are developed to support the overall development of each child.



Identification of Child Labourers

To ensure maximum outreach, the organization team members conducted door-to-door visits in the operational areas during the Annual Year 2024-25. During these visits, they identified children engaged in the glass & bangle industry. The team created awareness among parents and communities on: the importance of education for children's future, the harmful effects of child labour, especially in hazardous industries like glass and bangle and brick kiln and carpet industry making and the health



problems associated with such work, including respiratory issues, burns, and injuries. Through these intensive efforts:

- Total of 1500 child labourers were identified (1000 girls and 500 boys).
- Parents were successfully motivated to withdraw their children from work.
- All 1280 children were enrolled in which 423 boy and 857 girls in Vikas Sansthan's NFE centres, marking a significant step towards their education, empowerment, and safer future.



Learning Support & Material Distribution

- Total of 1280 freed child labourers received school kits (bags, notebooks, stationery) during the financial year 2024-25

Educational Exposure & Events

- March 2024: 53 children of brick kiln industry visited cultural and historical sites (Rapri Tourism Center, Bateshwar).



- July 2024: Drawing competitions engaged 154 children on the theme Child Labour vs. Education.

- May 2024: 41 freed child labourers participated in a debate competition on child labour and its consequences.

- Nov 2024: 247 children took annual exams in Hindi, English, and Math.

- Enrolment Drive - Awareness meetings with

202 parents & children emphasized compulsory school enrolment. Government teachers explained admission rules.

Outcome:

- Total of 1280 freed child labour attended 20 NFEs/formal schools during the financial year 2024-2025
- Over 1280 children provided with educational kits and support.
- Freed child labourers gained confidence, exposure, and motivation for continued learning.
- Parents increasingly committed to regular school attendance for their children.



Overall educational rehabilitation interventions of the organization contributed in

- Ensuring freed child labour education - Children attending the NFE centres became more confident and capable, improving their communication at home and in school.



- Many children successfully transitioned into formal schools after gaining confidence at the organization run non formal education centres.

- Some children even played a leadership role in their families and schools, influencing positive changes and taking responsibility for themselves and their peers.

Section 2. Health Interventions

Vikas Sansthan organized a series of health-focused activities for freed child labourers, adolescents, women, and families engaged in hazardous industries such as bangle, carpet, brick kilns, and glass work.



2.1. Health Camps

- Total of 1744 freed child labour, girls, women, families received Free health check-up camps and availed free health services in the project areas and adolescent girls were examined, with focus on anaemia, menstrual problems, infections, and diabetes.



2.2. Services Provided:

- Medical check-ups, free medicines, referrals to hospitals.
- Awareness sessions on hygiene, seasonal diseases, balanced diet, and risks of hazardous labour.
- Parents encouraged to withdraw children from harmful work and ensure regular health care.

2.3. Outcome:

- Total of 1774 patients directly benefited.
- Parents increasingly recognized the ill effects of child labour on children's health.
- Families pledged to adopt hygienic practices and access medical services regularly.

Section 3. Women Empowerment & SHG Development

The organization has been working on women empowerment issues. The focus is to enhance the socio-economic status of mothers of freed child labour & their families. Women can exercise their full potential and control over their own lives. The organization has been also assisting low-income households and micro enterprises, especially working with freed mother of child labour, to enhance their economic capacity by providing financial education and training.



The organization is also encouraging women to do saving, insurance and take loans for starting up of income generation activities through SHGs.

3.1. SHG Formation & Strengthening

Progress in SHGs – Total of 60 SHGs with 656 mothers of freed child labour are functional



- Total saving in SHGs – INR 743145 saved during reporting period
- Total loan in SHGs – INR 1305400 loan distributed during the reporting period
- Total repayment- INR 968050 repaid during the reporting period
- Total interest amount – INR 104390 interest amount is during reporting period
- Total balance loan amount of SHGs is INR

510185

- Total of 656 mothers of freed child labour from 60 SHGs has taken loan amount of INR 1305400 from livelihood purpose during the reporting period April 2024 to September 2024

3.2 Activities

- June 2024: Trainings in Rathore Nagar (76 participants) and Elani Nagar (34 participants).
- Aug 2024: Exposure training for 80 SHG members.
- March 2025: 48 SHG leaders trained on management, savings, and livelihood.

3.2 Themes Addressed

- Savings, loan management, transparency, collective decision-making.
- Women's empowerment, livelihood opportunities, fighting dowry & early marriage practices.
- Linking SHGs with child education and social empowerment.

3.3 Outcome:

- Over 656 women mobilized into SHGs.
- Women took leadership roles, challenged discrimination, and supported daughters' education.

Section 4. Gender Interventions

The organization works on Gender development, which focuses on promoting equality between women, men, girls, and boys by addressing the social, cultural, and economic barriers that create discrimination. Now 23 Adolescence Group formed in which 722 adolescence girls joined as members. It emphasizes the idea that both women and

men should have equal opportunities, rights, and responsibilities in every aspect of life—education, health, livelihood, decision-making, and leadership.

In practice, gender development means: Challenging stereotypes and discriminatory



practices, promoting education and empowerment of girls and women, ensuring equal access to resources, services, and opportunities, encouraging men and boys to actively support gender equality and Building communities where decisions are made in a fair and inclusive manner. The ultimate goal of gender development is to create a society where all individuals can realize their full potential without discrimination, and where women and

men contribute equally to social, economic, and cultural progress. Towards this, the organization has engaged with adolescents and promoting gender equality in the project areas.

4.1. Adolescent Girls' Empowerment

- July 2024: 165 girls trained on gender equality, rights, early marriage, abuse, and self-protection and safe guarding.



- Aug–Dec 2024: Regular gender-discrimination trainings reached 143 adolescent girls, who pledged to resist inequality and promote education.
- Jan–March 2025: Over 250 adolescent girls
- trained on menstrual hygiene, gender discrimination, and gender-based violence.

4.2 Menstrual Health & Hygiene



- Multiple trainings engaged 194 girls on menstrual health (Jan–March 2025).
- Topics: hygiene, nutrition, myths, infections, safe pad use, and disposal.
- Girls committed to spreading awareness among peers.

4.3 Outcome:

- Over 500 adolescent girls empowered with knowledge on health, rights, and leadership.
- Total of 30 Adolescent groups with 300 adolescents is functional for regular peer discussions and leadership practice.

Section 5. Community Collectives and Leadership

5.1 Baal Panchayat – Children’s Councils for Child Rights

Over the past year, Vikas Sansthan has freed several children from glass & bangle industry & brick kilns, linking them to Non-Formal Education (NFE) Centres. As a result, school attendance has increased while incidences of child labour in brick kilns have decreased. To institutionalize child participation, Vikas Sansthan formed Baal Panchayats (Children parliament) in its operational areas. These councils bring children together to:



- Strengthen their collective voice and leadership.

- Provide a platform to engage with adults, duty-bearers, and change agents on issues directly affecting them.
- Promote the right to participation, enabling children to speak out on issues that are often overlooked.
- 16 Baal Panchayat (Children Parliament) formed with 843 members of the children.



Baal Panchayat is a council formed by children themselves. It is not a game or a symbolic exercise; rather, it is a genuine platform where children take action for the protection and safeguarding of child rights. The primary focus of the Baal Panchayat (Children’s Parliament) is to:

- Improve the lives of freed child labourers.
- Ensure that children are treated with dignity.
- Guarantee access to education.
- Promote a safe and clean environment in slum areas.

Purpose of Baal Panchayat - The Baal Panchayat initiative was designed to:

- Involve children in asserting their rights.
- Build their sense of community involvement and responsibility.
- Train them to take up leadership roles in their communities.
- Empower them to solve problems affecting themselves and their peers.

Current Status and Reach

- Baal Panchayat Training (1st May 2024): 55 child leaders trained on rights and participation.
- 16 Baal Panchayats have been formed in the project areas.
- These councils have a collective membership of 843 children.

- Members meet regularly, with continuous facilitation and hand-holding support from Vikas Sansthan staff.

Issues Addressed by Baal Panchayat Members

Through training and support, members have developed awareness and leadership on:

- Child Rights and Child Labour
- Bonded Labour and Exploitation
- Child Participation
- Health, Sanitation, and Hygiene Practices
- Gender Equity and Non-Discrimination

Impact and Achievements

- The Baal Panchayats have played a crucial role in advancing the agenda of child rights and child labour elimination during the reporting period. Their active involvement has:
- Increased awareness in communities on the importance of education.
- Supported the reduction of child labour in brick kilns.
- Strengthened children’s confidence to speak up and influence decisions affecting their lives.

5.2. Adolescents Group – Kishori Balika Manch

Over the past year, Vikas Sansthan has recognized the importance of empowering adolescent girls and has taken significant strides by forming Kishori Balika Manch (Adolescent Girls’ Forums) within Community-Based Organisations (CBOs).



About Kishori Balika Manch

Kishori Balika Manch is a pioneering initiative that focuses on the growth, development, and empowerment of adolescent girls. These forums provide:



- A safe space for adolescent girls to share their concerns and experiences.
- Opportunities to actively participate in decisions that affect their lives.
- A collective platform to raise their voices against discrimination and child labour.

The forums also play a vital role in addressing challenges faced by adolescent girls, including:

- Gender inequity
- Limited access to education
- Child labour victimization

Vikas Sansthan's Efforts

During the past year, Vikas Sansthan has:

- Facilitated the formation and strengthening of 23 Adolescent Groups.
- Engaged a total of 722 adolescents through these forums.
- Promoted awareness on gender equity, rights protection, and leadership development.
- Worked to reduce instances of child labour and ensure adolescent girls are empowered to claim their rights.
- Adolescent & Parent Meetings: Over 600 parents engaged in sessions promoting education, gender equity, and livelihood planning.

Impact

- The Kishori Balika Manch (Adolescence girls Group) has become a platform of empowerment where adolescent girls learn, lead, and influence change within their communities. It is nurturing a new generation of young leaders who are better informed, confident, and determined to fight against child labour and gender discrimination.

5.3 Child Rights Protection Committee (CRPC) Monthly Meetings

A **Child Rights Protection Committee (CRPC)** is a community- or institution-based group formed to safeguard and promote the rights of children. It acts as a watchdog



mechanism at the grassroots level to ensure that children are protected from abuse, neglect, exploitation, and violence, and that they have access to their basic rights such as survival, development, protection, and participation. The committee usually consists of community leaders, teachers, parents, youth representatives, health workers, women's group members, and in some cases, children themselves.

A Child Rights Protection Committee is a **community-based protective structure** that works to **safeguard children's rights, prevent violations, raise awareness, monitor cases, and link families with support systems**—ultimately helping to build a **child-friendly and safe society**.

Purpose of a CRPC

The main purpose of a Child Rights Protection Committee is to create a **safe, supportive, and child-friendly environment** in which every child's rights are respected and fulfilled.

More specifically, the purposes are:

- **Prevention & Protection**
 - Prevent child labour, child marriage, trafficking, abuse, and exploitation.
 - Ensure children are safe at home, school, and in the community.
- **Awareness & Advocacy**
 - Educate parents, community members, and children about child rights and laws.
 - Advocate for children's issues with local authorities and institutions.
- **Monitoring & Reporting**
 - Identify children at risk and take timely action.
 - Act as a referral link between the community and child protection services (such as Childline 1098, police, or district child welfare committees).
- **Support & Rehabilitation**
 - Support rescued or vulnerable children with counselling, education, healthcare, and reintegration into safe environments.
- **Participation & Empowerment**
 - Promote the participation of children in decision-making processes affecting them.
 - Strengthening of **Bal Panchayats (children's groups)** and adolescent groups linked with the CRPC.

Every month, Child Rights Protection Committee (CRPC) meetings are organized across the project areas under the leadership of the CRPC members. These meetings serve as a regular platform for dialogue, review, and action on issues related to children's rights, protection, and welfare.

- CRPC Strengthening (23rd Dec 2024): 41 members trained on education and protection.

Purpose of the Meetings - The monthly CRPC meetings are designed to:

- Review cases of child labour, early marriage, and child abuse reported in the community.
 - Discuss the status of children's education, especially enrolment and retention in schools.
 - Monitor the overall health, safety, and protection of children in the area.



- Develop collective strategies to address challenges and ensure effective child rights protection.

Participation and Process

- Meetings are led by elected CRPC members, with participation from community leaders, parents, teachers, and sometimes adolescents.
- Vikas Sansthan team members facilitate the process, providing guidance and technical support where required.
- Case discussions, awareness sessions, and planning of community actions are key components of each meeting.



Outcomes Achieved

Through these regular meetings, CRPCs have been able to:

- Identify and prevent cases of child labour and child marriage.
- Link children with education and health services.
- Build awareness among parents and community members about child rights and protection laws.
- Strengthen community ownership in ensuring a safe, supportive, and child-friendly environment.

Overall Outcome of Community Collectives and Leadership

- Stronger community structures (CRPCs, Baal Panchayats, Adolescent Groups).
- Project team gained skills in leadership, counselling, gender sensitization, and documentation.
- Community leaders took ownership of education, health, and child protection.



Section 6. Entitlement Realizations

- Total of 193 child labour families received benefits from different government schemes during the reporting period

Section 7. Event Celebrations & Cultural Programs

- Independence Day (15 Aug 2024): 73 participants celebrated with flag hoisting, cultural performances, and distribution of uniforms & shoes.
- Gandhi Jayanti (2 Oct 2024): 152 participants engaged in quiz, cultural performances, and street play on substance abuse.
- International Day of the Girl Child (20 Nov 2024): 215 participants sensitized on girls' rights and empowerment.
- Christmas Day (25 Dec 2024): 122 children & girls celebrated with cultural activities, sports, and prize distribution.
- International Women's Rights Day (8 Mar 2025): 129 women and girls pledged for equality and empowerment.



Outcome:

- Festivals and national days used as platforms for awareness, unity, and confidence building.
- Cultural expression boosted self-esteem and advocacy for child rights.

Section 8. Project Management & Capacity Building

Staff Training & Exposure

- June 2024: Leadership training for 15 staff.
- July 2024: 10 senior staff exposure visit to AADHAR Sansthan, Khajuraho.
- Ag 2024: CRPC leadership training (58 members).
- Dec 2024: 39 instructors trained on joyful learning.
- Jan 2025: 15 staff oriented on child labour laws and project frameworks.
- March 2025: 11 staff trained on gender sensitization; 5 staff exposure visit to Ayodhya.

Section 9. Conclusion

Overall Impact during the Annual Year April 2024 to March 2025

- Education: 1280 + children supported with kits, exposure visits, debates, and exams
- Health: Over 1744 beneficiaries received medical check-ups, medicines, and awareness.
- Women Empowerment: 656 women mobilized through SHGs for economic and social development.

- Gender: 722+ adolescent girls empowered on rights, menstrual hygiene, and discrimination.
- Community Engagement: 600+ parents sensitized on education, health, and rejecting child labour.
- Entitlement Realization – More than 200 freed child labour families benefited through different government schemes & programme
- Capacity Building: Staff and community leaders trained to sustain long-term change.
